#### When I Am Weak

I have had my struggles with the Apostle Paul, found him arrogant, and often garbled and wordy, at least in the recording of his letters. I have struggled with the strange and troubling thought that, at least, the modern-day church seems to follow Paul's thinking as much as or more than Jesus's. As I continue to study and think on it, I realize that my trouble might be that Paul and I are too much alike. We are both passionate about our calling. We get to going so fast to get the job done that we often get ahead of ourselves. And we worry about what other people think of us. We both come away limping from the struggle and hopefully wiser for the experience.

In 2 Corinthians 12: 2-10, Paul talks about how God's strength is shown through our weakness. When we acknowledge our struggles and give them to God, God can work God's power in and through us. We, particularly as Americans, have a hard time thinking about weakness. We are soon to celebrate Independence Day and we are told all of our lives to "Buck up." "Be strong." "Big kids don't cry." "Never let them see you sweat." "Act like you know it, even when you don't." But as Christians, one of the first and probably hardest things we do is acknowledge our dependence on God.

Even the best and brightest of us can't do everything. But some of us keep trying as though we could if we worked at it hard enough. Perhaps the better thing is to share the work with others who excel at the things with which you struggle. I am notoriously bad at math and technology. I imagine that is due to a mental block and not spending enough time respectively, but luckily there are others I know to whom these things come easy. When we acknowledge our weakness, perhaps God will show us a better way. Perhaps God will bring someone alongside to help us. Perhaps God will use our experience to help others in their struggles.

I imagine I have shared many times my experience in the Girl's Athletic Club in Junior High School. I was exceedingly bad at all things sports related, but at the end of the year I was awarded the Best Teacher Award. My teachers said it was because people thought, "If Sally can do it, then anybody can." We are not in this alone and we are not to rely on our own strength or merit. That does not mean that we should not try and give it our best, but it does mean we should see who else might help us in our endeavor, and ultimately it reminds us to rely on God who is our strength.






#### Thanks ...






## Ongoing Opportunies
