### Working Beneath the Surface

Throughout the Old and New Testament, our world, our individual lives, and our hope are described as gardens – fresh and new, overgrown and trampled, promised and perfect. In the story of scripture, we begin and end in a garden again and again. Hope and opportunity to tend and nurture, disappointment in neglect and disobedience, hope in fertilization and replanting. Our life experiences, and our relationship to faith repeat like seasons of the year.

Gardening, like farming, is hard work – tilling, planting, watering, weeding, and harvesting. For all of that, for working with the unpredictable weather and the bugs and critters who want the harvest for their own, for the timing and the diligence of the work, perhaps it is the unknown that is the hardest, the waiting, the trusting, that something is at work beyond our sight, beyond our control that is burrowing, bursting, blooming into something beautiful, something vital, something delicious.

This spring, I have had the opportunity to participate in the Clinton Foundation's course for Empowering Faith Leaders to work in communities impacted by substance abuse, addiction, and overdose. (You will hear more about this work in the coming months.) The leaders have stressed how important it is to understand addiction not as a moral failing, but as a disease, and the path of recovery as nothing less than transformation of individuals and of communities. I am reminded of our discussions of Lent this season, of the fig tree in the parable that the gardener wanted to give a little more time to see if it would bear fruit. We often waste our precious time on shame and guilt while God continues to offer us time for growth and patience and renewal. We have the chance to focus not on what have we done wrong, but on what is God working within us to make us new. What do we need to weed out to give light and space to that work? How can we rest in the assurance that God is tending and nurturing our souls?

A scripture that always surprises and delights me is in the gospel of John's description of the resurrection. Mary in the garden, devastated with grief and despair, is seeking her Lord; seeing someone in the distance, "she mistakes him for the gardener." I picture Jesus in overalls with a bandana in his pocket, perhaps handing it to Mary for her to wipe her tears. And, then he calls her by name. God is working within us, in ways seen and unseen, to renew, restore, and transform us into new creatures.

In ourselves this season of Lent, may we let the seeds of hope and love, justice and peace be planted in our lives, that we may know with confidence and joy, as the promise of Easter grows, that nothing can separate us from the love and care God has for each one of us.



# Drop-In Center gets new digs!




